Children's Trust of South Carolina produces child well-being profiles for each county in South Carolina. This work is done in partnership with the Annie E. Casey Foundation (AECF) and the South Carolina Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office. The county profiles are modeled after the AECF's KIDS COUNT state and national profiles.

The county profiles of child well-being include four domains and four indicators in each domain for a total of 16 indicators. Just like the KIDS COUNT national and state profiles, the county profiles include four domains: economic, education, health, and family and community. When county-level data are available, the profiles use the same indicators as KIDS COUNT. When county-level data are not available, the profiles use proxies for the KIDS COUNT indicators.

## What can you do?

The county profiles can be used in a number of different ways. For example, the profiles can be used in grant writing, service decision-making, policy and advocacy and many more. We hope you will use the county profiles to improve outcomes for children and families in South Carolina.

# UNION COUNTY

## Why is this important?

When children meet educational milestones, live in economically and emotionally stable homes and live in supportive communities, they are more likely to thrive and grow into productive, contributing citizens of our state.

Currently, too many of South Carolina's children live in environments that put them at risk for many negative outcomes, including child abuse and neglect. The data paints a very alarming picture for South Carolina's future.

## Where does this data come from?

Children's Trust of South Carolina produces child well-being profiles for each county in South Carolina. This work is done in partnership with the Annie E. Casey Foundation (AECF) and the South Carolina Revenue and Fiscal Affairs Office. The county profiles are modeled after the AECF's KIDS COUNT state and national profiles.

The county profiles of child well-being include four domains and four indicators in each domain for a total of 16 indicators. Just like the KIDS COUNT national and state profiles, the county profiles include four domains: economic, education, health, and family and community. When county-level data are available, the profiles use the same indicators as KIDS COUNT. When county-level data are not available, the profiles use proxies for the KIDS COUNT indicators.

## What can you do?

The county profiles can be used in a number of different ways. For example, the profiles can be used in grant writing, service decision-making, policy and advocacy and many more. We hope you will use the county profiles to improve outcomes for children and families in South Carolina.
