Why Pinwheels?



Its bright colors and spinning motion symbolize hope, happiness, and the potential for a positive future. By planting pinwheels in public spaces, communities raise awareness about child abuse and emphasize the collective responsibility to protect and support children.

Making the Case for Prevention: Key Messages and Talking Points

Take advantage of opportunities to share the mission of your organization and how you work daily to prevent child abuse and neglect. Customize these and include your programs, mission and opportunities for others to join you.

- Raising awareness is a critical first step in preventing child abuse and neglect. Child Abuse Prevention Month is our opportunity to grow support for what we know must happen year-round: supporting parents and building communities so that families can readily access what they need to help their children grow healthy and strong.
- Children are safe when their families are strong, and families are strong when the community surrounds them with support. It takes all of us working together to ensure that our communities are places where children and their families thrive.
- We believe that prevention is the most cost-effective and effective way to address abuse and the best investment we can make in our future.
- Child abuse prevention involves anything that strengthens families and helps them thrive. This could be a parenting program or helping a family meet their basic needs.
- Prevention can also involve simple actions, such as taking the kids to the park for a few hours or being a sympathetic listener to an overwhelmed parent.
- We believe prevention is rooted in five protective factors that, when present, greatly reduce the incidence of maltreatment: parents have friends, parents know how to be resilient and bounce back from challenges, parents understand how children grow and develop and can help their children express their own feelings. Most importantly, parents can access support to help them meet their basic needs, like putting food on the table, paying their rent and accessing quality health care.
- Prevention is crucial because we know the long-term effects of adverse childhood experiences (also known as ACEs), and toxic stress can have adverse health outcomes long into adulthood.
 In South Carolina, 62 percent of adults experience at least one ACE during childhood.
- ACEs are those experiences that are so toxic and stressful that
 they can alter a child's brain chemistry, such as experiencing or
 witnessing violence in the home or community, growing up in a
 family with mental health or substance use problems, and losing
 loved ones from incarceration, divorce, or death.
- Despite experiencing ACEs, children can also experience
 positive things. We know these things can help children and
 youth build resilience: feeling safe and protected by an adult in
 their home or family, feeling a sense of belonging in high school,
 feeling supported by friends, being able to talk about their
 feelings, participating in community traditions and feeling that
 two more non-parent adults took a genuine interest in them.





What is Child Abuse Prevention?

Prevention is anything that strengthens families and helps children thrive. Prevention can be evidence-based programs that help parents with the skills to build a strong family. It can also be simple actions like helping an overwhelmed parent by taking the kids to the park for a few hours or being a sympathetic listener.

In South Carolina, there are many different programs, strategies and solutions that support children and families. Prevention work falls into three broad categories, and prevention is most effective when all three are at work.



Levels of Prevention

Tertiary

- Individuals associated with indicated cases of abuse and neglect
- · Maltreatment has occurred
- Reduce the negative consequences of maltreatment and prevent recurrence

Secondary

- · Support high-risk populations
- Before abuse and neglect
- · Targeted prevention, family strengthening programs

Primary

Child Abuse Prevention Month is primary prevention

- · Universal, for everyone
- · Before abuse and neglect
- Everyone can benefit from understanding child abuse and neglect
- · Builds responsibility for prevention

Encouraging Local Media: Successful Child Abuse Prevention Month Coverage

Pivot to prevention

This is your opportunity to focus on the upstream actions we can take to prevent abuse and neglect. While some reporters will want to know about a child who has suffered, take the opportunity to pivot away from an individual case and talk about the broader work you do in the community. Preventing child abuse and neglect is a serious - and joyful - business.

Be confident in the newsworthiness of your activities and participation

You do important work, and your communities care about children. News outlets are also in the business of supporting their communities and have a lot of airtime and bandwidth to fill.

Reach out in March

Contact a few news outlets you think might be particularly interested in your work. Introduce them to protective factors, and talk about your mission and what you do to keep families strong. Ask them to run a feature in April about what you do all year.

Send a press release a week before Child Abuse Prevention Month starts or before your event

Follow up with a phone call to ensure they know what they need to know to cover the event.

Prepare for an interview

Know your key talking points and practice saying them aloud. During the interview, repeat the main messages you want to share. Be concise, honest and professional. Help others feel your passion.

Promote your story once it is published

Share the coverage on social media, newsletters or websites. Thank the news outlet and the reporter for covering your story.

Build the relationship

Reporters will often express an interest in a follow-up story. Follow up and remind them of the opportunity. Like everyone, they get busy, and when you help them with great story ideas, it is often appreciated.

Remember, non-traditional content providers

Many in your community regularly produce social media content and have followers. Think about real estate agents, the faith community, health professionals and wellness experts. Follow them and like their content. Authentically build reciprocal social engagement.

Involving Your Elected Officials: Coordinating a Proclamation

Child Abuse Prevention Month is an excellent opportunity to speak with your elected officials—in Washington, Columbia or at home in your community—including those on county, city, and town councils and school boards.

Let them know that April is Child Abuse Prevention Month and how important it is to support children and families. Share with them the work you do every day. Ask them to issue a proclamation.

February

Draft a proclamation

On scchildren.org/capmonth, you will find a sample proclamation you can customize with your county's data. Submit your draft. Confirm the date, time and place and whether someone from your organization should be prepared to say a few words.

March

Invite stakeholders

Identify and invite those with broad community connections to stand with you during the reading. Think about board members, sponsors and committed volunteers.

April

Attend the reading

Show your elected leaders that their constituencies support your work.

April and beyond

Share

Make sure you get some pictures from the reading. Share those on social media, thanking and tagging the proclamation sponsors and your supporters. Read the proclamation at your event, place it in your lobby or share it in your newsletters.

WHEREAS, we acknowledge that we must work together as a community in partnership to build awareness about child abuse and neglect and contribute to promote the social and emotional well-being of children, youth and families in a safe, stable, and nurturing environment; and

WHEREAS, prevention remains the best defense for our children and families; and

WHEREAS, in fiscal year 2023-2024, there were 7,498 substantiated Child Protective Services (CPS) investigations with 13,397 children in South Carolina, and XXX investigations with XXX children in XXXX County (insert data from SC DSS).

Building The Village for Families

As the proverb reminds us, it takes a village to raise a child. Children and their families need a vibrant, healthy, and caring community, which includes everything from jobs to housing to health care and quality child care. Thriving communities are built with robust connections, and Child Abuse Prevention Month is a opportunity to show support, strengthen those networks and build community.

- Businesses can use their outdoor marquees to declare, "April is Child Abuse Prevention Month" or "Be a Champion for Children." They can also share prevention materials, plant a pinwheel garden or host a family-friendly discount night.
- Child care providers can share SC Parents materials, offer a parenting class or host an event that helps parents bond with their children.
- Volunteers can distribute flyers or brochures throughout the community, including libraries, grocery stores, banks, shopping centers and medical offices. Materials can be found at scChildren.org/month.
- Board members can host a fundraising event and invite their networks to participate.
- Faith-based groups can connect parents through peer support groups or parenting classes.
- Law enforcement agencies can offer workshops on how to make their community more secure and safe.

- Media outlets can cover your Month's events and feature stories on how your programs positively impact children and families.
- Schools can send home information about healthy child development and positive parent-child interactions or sponsor an essay or art contest with a family-oriented theme.
